

## **DiamondJacks owner follows through with sale of casino**

Legends Gaming, LLC, the operator of the DiamondJacks Casino in Bossier City will move forward with the sale of its assets to Global Gaming Solutions, LLC as part of a Chapter 11 Plan of Reorganization.

The sale will be subject to approval by the United States Bankruptcy Court for the Western District of Louisiana.

Global is a wholly-owned limited liability company of the Chickasaw Nation headquartered in Oklahoma. Global subsidiaries own Remington Park, a racetrack/casino in Oklahoma City, and a significant stake in the ownership group of Lone Star Park, a racetrack in Grand Prairie, Texas that is operated by Global. Legends will continue normal operations at both of its properties under the direction of its existing management team with the same staff.

"Both of our casinos will continue to operate as usual, and we will continue to provide our guests with the same great value and service they have always enjoyed at our properties. Upon completion of the sale process, DiamondJacks will be part of Global Gaming and its parent family, which includes WinStar, the second largest casino in the world, and will have the backing of one of the largest casino operators in the Texas-Oklahoma-Louisiana market. We look forward to working with Global to improve the excellent product we have at our Bossier City property," said Raymond Cook, president of Legends.

William J. McEnery, chairman and CEO for Legends, said the sale will not affect employees and their jobs.

"Our team members are essential to our future success, and should see no difference in their jobs. We believe that we have found a buyer who will continue DiamondJacks' commitments to the communities in which we operate as well as to its most valued asset, our team members," he said.

"Upon successful completion of the acquisition, we are eager to begin working with and creating stability for the companies' excellent employees and to continue to serve DiamondJacks gaming patrons across the southern U.S.," said John Elliott, CEO of Global.
